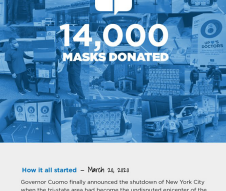

14,000 MASKS DONATED

How it all started - March 24, 2020

Governor Cuomo finally announced the shutdown of New York City when the tri-state area had become the undisputed epicenter of the virus. New York City was at its heart. At the time, the New York Times reported that COVID-19 had caused 17,638 deaths in the state, with 12,067 of the deaths concentrated in New York City. It wasn't until April 28th that the death toll finally plateaued. Throughout the ordeal, an extreme shortage of PPE meant that the city's health care workers and first responders risked their lives through the bleakest days of the pandemic. Although the task at hand was a far cry from merchant services, we were determined to help nonetheless. Despite the scarcity, we were fortunate enough to find help from our contacts abroad in securing thousands of N95 masks. We then personally packed and delivered the masks to the hospitals and first responders in the city that needed them most.



Mar. 31, 2020

Bellevue Hospital Center
Of our initial shipment of N95 masks, only 1,000 cleared customs. With Coronavirus cases quickly increasing in New York City, our CEO, Saini Hany and our COO, Butler Yang immediately set out to deliver the masks. Our first stop was dropping off 500 of the masks at the Bellevue Hospital Center where the health care workers were in dire need of PPE equipment.



Mar. 31, 2020

Elmhurst Hospital Center
We delivered the remaining 500 N95 from our first shipment to the Elmhurst Hospital Center in Queens.



Apr. 14, 2020

Jacobi Medical Center
With a car loaded up with the latest shipment of masks, Saini and Sant made their way out to the Bronx where they delivered 3,000 N95 Masks to the Jacobi Medical Center.



Apr. 15, 2020

12,000 More Masks Arrive
Our masks finally clear customs and arrive safely in New York for distribution.



Apr. 15, 2020

NYFD 5th Precinct
The next day, Saini got a little help delivering the second round of masks from good friend and Universal Processing partner, Johnny Yau. Their first stop was the 5th Precinct in Chinatown where they dropped off 1,000 masks for officers and first responders.



Apr. 14, 2020

Clare Hass Medical Center
The second stop of the day took Saini and Butler across the George Washington Bridge to New Jersey where they dropped off another 2,000 N95 Masks.



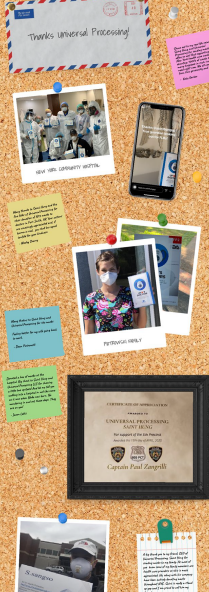
May 6, 2020

Local Community Hospitals
As PPE supplies began to catch-up at major hospitals in New York we turned our attention towards smaller local community hospitals as well as other private practices and health care providers throughout the country who were prepared to re-open with the city on May 15th. We delivered thousands of masks to private practices in the city and mailed out others to health care professionals and first responders in other where PPE supply was still lacking.
